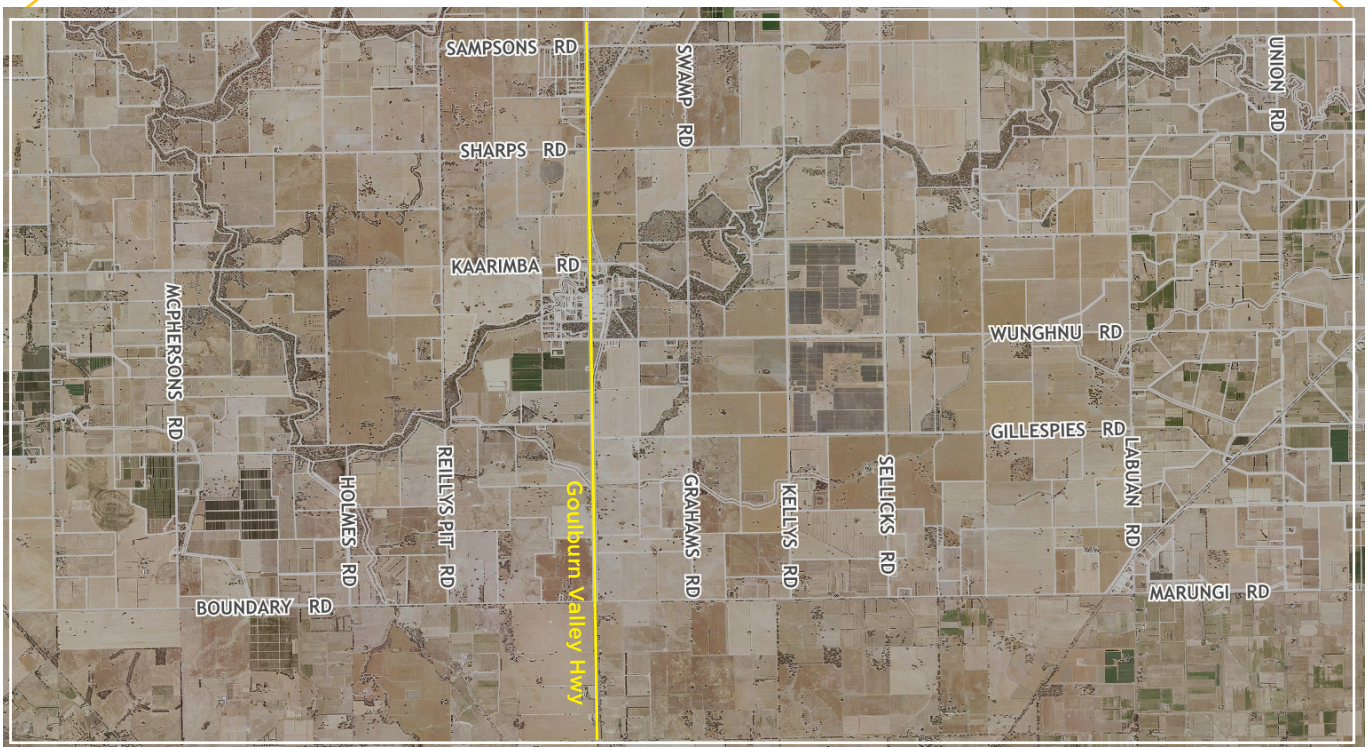

## INTRODUCTION TO COMMUNITY PLANNING

Have you ever heard someone in your community say that they'd love to see something new in town? A walking track? A mum's group? More events? A market? Have you ever wondered how many other people feel the same way?

Community Planning is about creating a safe space for you and your neighbours to discuss the future of your town, to explore all of those questions and more, and come up with ideas that will make your local area an even stronger, more beautiful, and more inclusive community.

Community Planning isn't about giving Council a wish list, though Council will take on board all of the views and opinions expressed during the process. It's about local people making sustainable change collaboratively, and making good things happen for everyone in their community.

After all, a goal without a plan is just a wish. Community Planning is about wrapping realistic strategies around everyone's hopes and dreams so that they can become a reality.





## COMMUNITY VOICE

On Sunday 24 November 2019, over 50 people joined staff from Moira Shire Council's Community Development team at a BBQ brunch to begin the conversation about creating a plan for the Wunghnu & District community.

Surveys were also distributed via the Redgum Courier, with return boxes placed at the Wunghnu Tavern and the post office. We had 5 completed surveys returned.

### What we asked:

- What do you love about Wunghnu & District, and why?
- What is your hope for Wunghnu & District's future?
- If you could choose one thing to happen in our community, what would it be?

Through the BBQ brunch and returned surveys, we not only established what participants loved about Wunghnu & District, we also started to get a sense of what could make the town and district even better.

From here, the Wunghnu & District Voice committee was formed from community members who submitted their interest to take a leading role in the development of the Community Plan. The Committee had its first official meeting in February 2020, reconvening again in March 2021 after 12 months of suspended meetings due to COVID-19.



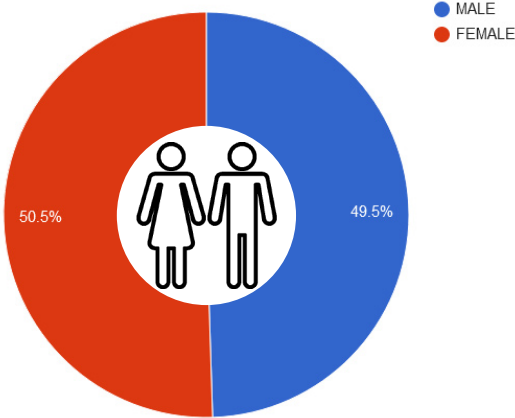

## OUR HISTORY

Wunghnu & District consists of the township of Wunghnu and the parish's of Drumanure, and Mundoona. First survey and selected in the early 1870's for closer settlement based primarily on 320 acre lots.

The country originally was occupied by Wandering groups of the Bangarang Aboriginal tribe, which came annually to camp east of the railway bridge at Wunghnu.



There they fished and collected water birds, eggs and chicks from the local swamps. Wunghnu's name is derived from the Aboriginal word [one yah] meaning Boomerang.

From 1840 - 1870, the area was occupied by large grazing runs manly Tallygaroopna and Katandra in the South and Strathmerton run north of the creek. Mundoona and Drumanure Parish's consisted of some excellent country to grow crops earning a reputation as producing high yielding and highly sought after produce. These communities developed amenities of their own. Drumanure opened a school in 1882 including post office, two churches and for some time a creamery. Mundoona opened two schools. Mundoona North opened 1885 near Galts Bridge and a school first called Kaarimba later renamed Mundoona opened in 1876 located in Walshes Bridge South Rd, south of Kaarimba Rd along with two churches and a creamery.

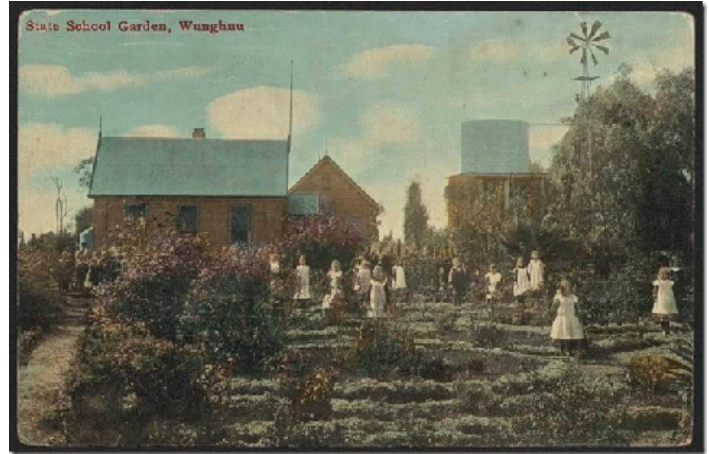


Wunghnu township began to be established [after being surveyed in 1875], developing into an important community supply and trading centre. The first store was opened by M.A. Dockery however it is hard to visualise today that it was a thriving regional centre. In its heyday, it boasted five hotels, four blacksmiths, two large and two small stores, two butchers, a saddlery, flourmill, creamery, boot maker, carpenter, two banks, a police station and post office, along with two churches.



## OUR HISTORY

The main street was lit with street lamps, being one of the earliest towns to have this luxury. A Mechanics Institute was opened in 1890 to provide services and entertainment to the growing community. Still operating today as a tavern, it is providing a similar service. Reticulated water was provided following the construction of the water tower in 1906 by Sir John Monash. The first of a number of water towers built in the region from concrete using floating forms.



The railway came to Wunghnu in 1881 and the station grew to be an important district hub for the next 60 years. It boasted cattle and sheep trucking yards, grain terminal, goods shed, dining room, waiting room, office, as well being the land office and Court Registry for many years. Wunghnu Primary School opened in 1877, winning awards for its vegetable gardens on several occasions. Always a very sporting community over the years, Wunghnu supported a Football Club, Tennis Club, Cricket Club, and Gun Club. One of the first lawn Bowls Clubs in country Victoria was established in Wunghnu along with Croquet. Easter Monday sports started in 1897 and ran for 60 years. They included horse, bicycle and foot races and concluded with a dance in the Mechanic Institute.

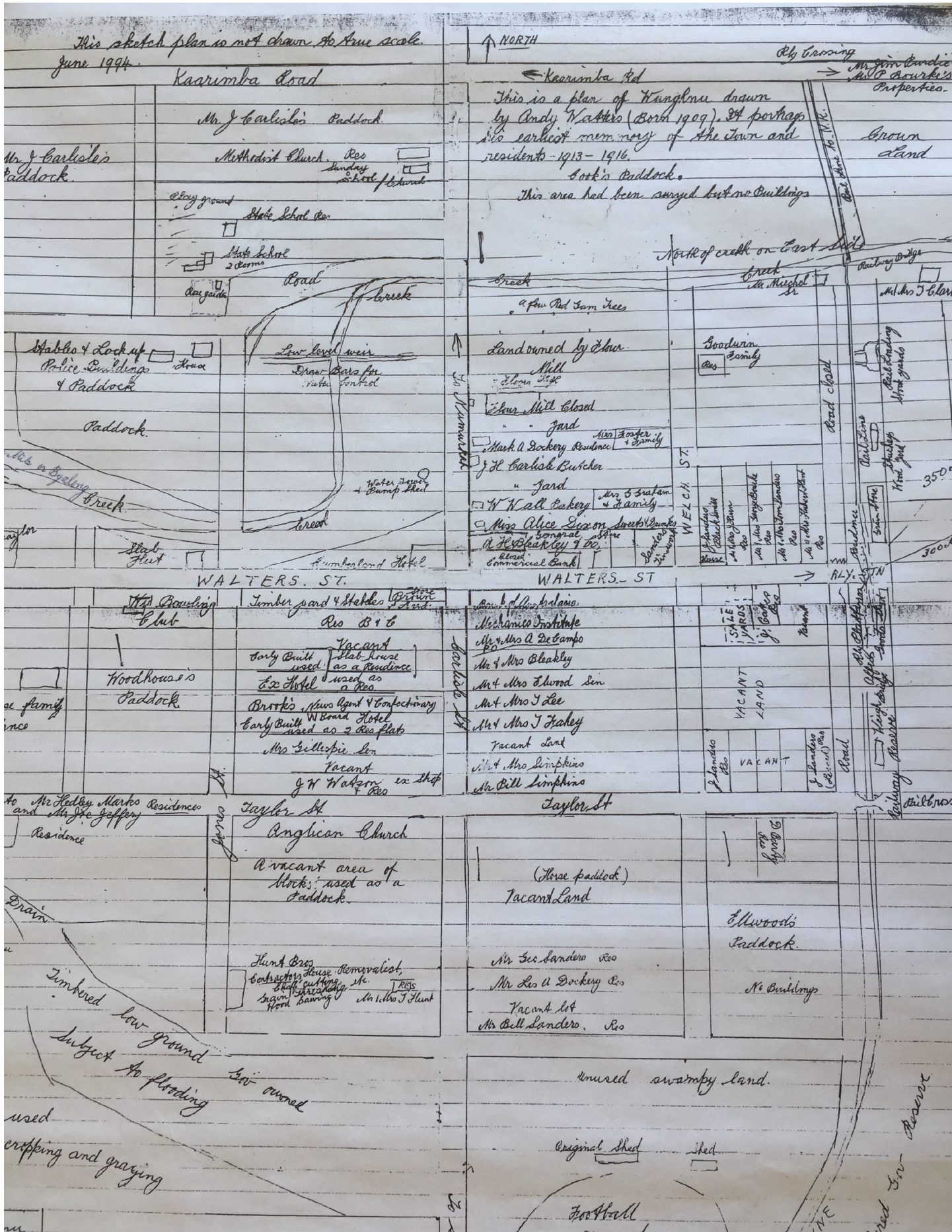


Today little remains of the many grand buildings after the main street was widened in the 1950's requiring their removal. Wunghnu though is still a thriving community encompassing the school, post office/cafe, tavern [Mechanics Institute], Bowls Club, Fire Brigade, service station, as well as a wide range of businesses. The Railway Station is now closed. Football and tennis are no longer played although the Recreational Reserve is now home to a new Community Centre, Vintage Tractor Club and Moira Miniature Railway.
