
Introduction to Community Planning



Our Community Voice

On Friday 5 April 2019, over 50 people joined the Moira Shire Council Community Development Team at a BBQ to begin the conversation about creating a plan for the Waaia community. Surveys were also distributed via the Redgum Courier and a letterbox drop, with return boxes placed at the Waaia Hotel, the Waaia Recreation Reserve, and the post office. We had 12 completed surveys returned.

WHAT WE ASKED



Through the Community BBQ and returned surveys, we not only established what participants loved about Waaia, we also started to get a sense of what could make the town and district even better. From here, the WCP (Waaia Community Planning) Committee was formed from community members who submitted an expression of interest to take a leading role in the development of the Community Plan. The Committee began meeting monthly from Monday 29 April 2019.



The name Waaia was derived from a word used by local Aboriginal people meaning Crow. In the early days, the area where the town is now situated was known as Baulkamaugh West. This area was first settled by farmers in 1877. Prior to that, it was a portion of a sheep run held by squatters from Tallygaroopna and Kaarimba.

The original township of Waaia, as surveyed in 1877, was on a site immediately north of the Broken Creek at Walsh's Bridge, but this land was subject to flooding and was not suitable for development and ceased to be thought of as a town.

The building of the railway line, linking Numurkah and Nathalia, followed a more direct route and on higher ground, which was more suitable for development. A large deputation of farms had met railway commissioners touring the district and it was agreed that an intermediate station would be built at Waaia, and from here, the town began to develop on its present site.

The station was built on George Fitzgerald's section of land and farmers were able to cart the 1877-1878 harvest to it. As the railway line was not complete, loads of wheat were carted away by contractor's engines used in the construction of the railway line.

In 1877, Messrs James, Moncrieff and Thomas McTighe subdivided part of their properties into building allotments and they were sold, bringing in extraordinary prices at the time, with the highest price being £80 for a half acre block. Several private homes were erected and businesses opened. It was considered that Waaia would become a town of some importance.




A wooden building along the railway line was erected by George McLelland as the Waaia Hotel. Mr Edward Sutcliffe opened a blacksmith shop, and J.M. McClure opened a general store. Another general store was opened by Brown & Corke, as well as a bootmaker (Mills), saddler (Snow), another blacksmith (Toone), and a wheelwright and coachbuilding business (Mr D. Hepworth). A creamery was established on the south side of the railway by Mr Jack Scott. Also, a bakers shop, dressmakers rooms, and a butchers shop opened. Another landmark was a wineshop and vineyard on Brensing's property.

On 14 June 1888, a petition by Thomas Canning and seven others was forwarded to the Education Department through the Board of Advice for the establishment of a school. On 17 July 1888, the Numurkah District School Board of Advice held a meeting to discuss a letter from the Education Department in reference to a petition signed by eight residents in Baulkamaugh West (Waaia) requesting that a school be established in that place.



On 28 January 1890, the school (N°2968) was opened by Mr Arthur Jamieson, who was the first teacher.

Sport has always been a big part of country living, and in 1893 the Waaia Cricket Club was established. This was followed by the Waaia Football Club in 1894, and later tennis as well as netball. The sporting clubs at Waaia have been very successful over the years, winning many premierships along the way.



Farming in the early days was dry land, which consisted mainly of sheep and wheat production. After World War II, the building of the irrigation channels and the introduction of the solider settlement system caused the farming landscape to change to mainly dairy farming on irrigated farm land.






