Protecting homes against bushfire — clearing of native vegetation

Native vegetation is important to many Victorians and its removal is carefully regulated by the planning system. A planning permit is required to remove native vegetation unless a relevant exemption applies.

The Victorian Government has announced temporary exemptions to help landowners reduce fuel load around their homes as part of their preparations for the 2009/10 bushfire season. This fact sheet explains the temporary exemptions for fire protection and how they will apply this summer.

These exemptions have been introduced to all regional, rural and selected Melbourne metropolitan areas. Check the back of this fact sheet to see if the interim measures apply to your local council area.

Getting your property Fire Ready

The '10/30 right' is part of a suite of measures to help Victorians in areas of risk from bushfire prepare for the season ahead.

Residents should seek advice from their local CFA regarding their bushfire survival plans and should seek advice from their local council about implementing a sensible balance between providing a safer home and maintaining vegetation on their property.

In addition to vegetation management, the ability to defend your house and property from bushfire can be influenced by a number of factors including:

- the preparation of your household's bushfire survival plan
- house location, including aspect and surrounding land form
- the building structure and materials and
- available water supply, including tanks and swimming pools, pumps or sprinkler systems.

10/30 right and fenceline clearing

The 10/30 right simplifies the right to clear vegetation around your home for bushfire protection without obtaining a planning permit. The right allows landowners to clear without a planning permit:


- 1. all vegetation, including trees, within 10 metres of your house
- 2. all vegetation (except for trees) within 30 metres of your house. See Figure 1.

You can also remove all native vegetation either side of your property boundary fence to a combined maximum width of 4 metres without a permit.

You can only clear native vegetation on your property if you own it. If you are renting or want to clear vegetation on other properties including public reserves or roadsides, you need the written permission of the landowner or relevant public land manager.

Bushfires rely on fine fuels including leaf litter, twigs and shrubs on the surface to develop speed and intensity. The 10/30 right will help residents reduce the amount and availability of fine fuels, reducing fire intensity and risk.

Firewood collection

You can remove fallen wood from certain roadsides without a permit during "firewood collection periods". Designated firewood collection periods will be advertised in your local paper and will occur two weeks prior to planned fuel reduction burns. There will be signs along roadsides showing you where fallen wood may be collected during these periods. If in doubt, check with your local council. Designated firewood collection periods will be organised by road management authorities. Outside the advertised firewood collection periods, you may need permission to collect fallen wood from roadsides.

Safety

Planned fuel reduction burns will only apply to roadside reserves selected by road management authorities in consultation with the CFA and DSE because of an identified fire risk and minimal

biodiversity impacts. All stages of the planned burns and roadside firewood collection will be undertaken at an appropriate date and time using a VicRoads endorsed traffic management plan to manage road safety and traffic congestion.

Fire prevention notice

You can still remove native vegetation without a permit to comply with a fire prevention notice issued by the Country Fire Authority (CFA) or the Department of Sustainability & Environment (DSE).

Fuel reduction burns

You need a permit from DSE or CFA to carry out fuel reduction burning on your property. You should also be aware of fire restrictions in your area before lighting any fire. If in doubt, please check with your local council.
