Introduction

From April 2017 to May 2017 every member of the community was invited to have their say and was asked:

- 1. What do you love about Katamatite?
- 2. What is your hope for Katamatite's future?
- 3. If you could choose one thing or project to happen in your community what would it be?
- 4. What do you want Katamatite to be known for?
- 5. Would you like to be part of implementing specific projects

From this the initial community consultation for the Katamatite Community Plan was created.

Our Vision

A vision is a statement that is about where you believe you will be in the future and not about where you are at present.

Committee members were presented with the community's vision from the community forum. There were common themes identified including the town being progressive, attractive and connected. From the community forum inputs, the vision statement below was presented and adopted by the committee:

'Katamatite is a growing, attractive and thriving community where our people work together in building our greatest community assets and values.'

Purpose of this plan

Community Planning is about local community members coming together to shape the future.

It gives the Katamatite community greater ownership of the plans that affect the area and empowers local people to play an active role in what happens in the town in which they live.



Local people are always the best source of knowledge and wisdom about their surroundings. The community's participation, desire to contribute and their local knowledge plays a significant role in decision making, implementing actions and ultimately a great future.

This community plan aims to:

- Ensure that Katamatite residents have a shared vision, view and understanding of Katamatite's priorities.
- Develop priorities that are focused on sustainable outcomes that are implementable.
- Reflect a community planning process based on the values of democracy, trust, equity, social justice, openness, mutual respect, collaboration and inclusion.
- Recognise that community members have the desire and knowledge to contribute to decision making in their community.
- Recognise that communities want to be worked with rather than worked on by all sectors in which they engage.








History & Background of Katamatite

Aboriginal History

Katamatite is a small rural township of 433 people located 229 km north of Melbourne and 50 km north-east of Shepparton, located in Moira Shire local government area on the Tocumwal-Benalla Road approximately 11 kilometres South West of Cobram.



Canoe trees, old cooking sites and the discovery of stone implements stand as testimony to the occupation of this area by Aborigines prior to white settlement.

Aboriginal Place name for Katamatite (Catamatiet or Catamateet) - name of a creek (Katamatite, The First 100 Years 1876-1976 by Ada Rudd).

Norman B. Tindale compiled a map of Tribal Boundaries in Aboriginal Australia 1974. This map shows that the Katamatite area was part of the territory of the Kwat Kwat Tribe (also known as the Emu Mudjug Tribe). (archives.samuseum.sa.gov.au).

Kenn Rogers in his book "The Story of Cobram, 2002" (page 3) talks about the Bangerang (also known as Pangerang) Tribe and suggests that the KWAT KWAT could have been a 'series of lesser tribes but broadly of the Bangerang people'.

Kevin Atkinson of the Bangerang Nation was told by his Elders that the KWAT KWAT were a sub- tribe of the Bangerang Nation. Kevin presented the 'Welcome To Country' at Katamatite's first 'Big Day Out in A Little Town' Event in 2015.

Katamatite Timeline - First 50 years*

- 1841 Squatter Edward Knull took up the 'Tallygaroopna' run. It was on this land that Katamatite would later develop.
- 1848 A subdivision saw the future town site become part of the 'Katandra' run.
- 1874 The township of Katamatite was surveyed by S. K Vickery.
- 1876 Settlers began to arrive.



- 1878 a Post Office opened within Moore's Hotel & the first school opened
- 1879 a bridge was built over the Boosey Creek
- 1881 a Bank Agency of the Bank of Australasia, Yarrawonga opened, the first mounted policeman was stationed here and a weir commenced.
- 1882 the first Wesleyan Church was built by this year and the first race meeting held
- 1885 the Race Course was gazetted and Katamatite was proclaimed a Township
- 1890 Katamatite Dookie Tramway (Railway), the first train arrived in Katamatite in April of this year
- 1891 Mechanics Hall opened
- 1910 new sale yards erected
- 1929 Katamatite had a Cottage Hospital by this year

The Katamatite Recreation Reserve is a popular social and recreational focal point for locals and visitors.

The Katamatite Tigers football team competes in the Picola & District Football League. The team received publicity and notoriety back in 1925, when they defeated Wattville 78.19 (487) to 1.3 (9), in an attempt to win the minor premiership on percentage from Dookie.


Katamatite Cricket Club continue a proud 135+ year history (the earliest *recorded* game being played in 1882, though the Katamatite club had been established by the early settlers some time before that). Still

- Appropriate amendments and updates to the Community Plan will be made to ensure that it remains current and reflects any significant changes in the community.
