

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

INTRODUCTION TO COMMUNITY PLANNING

Community Planning is about creating a safe space for you and your neighbours to discuss the future of your town, and come up with ideas that will make your local area an even stronger, more beautiful, and a more inclusive community.

Community planning allows and encourages a broad range of local people to be included in the process. The community plan is not influenced by government or other organisations – it is the St James Community Plan and the residents determine the outcomes.

It's about local people making sustainable change collaboratively, and making good things happen for everyone in their community.

After all, a goal without a plan is just a wish. Community Planning is about wrapping realistic strategies around everyone's hopes and dreams so that they can become a reality.

WHY DOES ST JAMES NEED A COMMUNITY PLAN?

The northern region of Victoria, of which St James & District is part, continues to grow and according to information received by the Moira Shire, could grow as much as 20% over the next 20 years.

This will mean new houses and additional people coming to the region and St James, all with different ideas about what is needed and putting pressure on existing requirements and facilities. It is also an opportunity for the St James community to participate in the economic growth of the region.

Through community planning, the residents of this community should identify those matters and issues that are important to the district and formulate priorities according to resident's wishes and take responsibility for its implementation.

When these issues become a formalised community plan, the key actions can be identified and implemented through setting priorities.

The community plan includes a broad range of social, infrastructure and economic needs of St James & District as seen by the residents.

The community plan can be used as a basis for advocacy to local government, other levels of government and other organisations for funding and support to get the various prioritised projects off the ground.


The key aims of the process in developing the community plan are:

- It identifies local community requirements.
- It gains input, information and guarantees a role for local groups, committees or individuals.
- It accesses technical assistance from people within the community and other supporters such as council to develop plans and initiatives.
- It gains broader participation and shared responsibility by more residents participating in the community development.
- Increases positive attitudes about this community to achieve outcomes.

FUTURE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE COMMUNITY PLAN

The St James & District Community Coordinators Committee are responsible for ensuring there is activity associated with the community plan.

Their role is to involve organisations and individuals as they see fit, to undertake the ongoing action planning and implementation of each of the key issues identified in the community planning process.



The Committee are responsible for and will:

- a. Ensure the community plan is activated
- b. Involve more people in the development of the action planning and implementation, including those organisations that have a stake in the process.
- c. Receive information about opportunities and government grants.
- d. Provide information to Moira Shire.
- e. Receive requests and new ideas for inclusion in the community plan.
- f. Ensure that the process to alter the community plan or review of the community plan is undertaken using a public meeting process.
- g. Assist groups with applications and information.
- h. Promote the community plan within the St James district.








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OUR HISTORY

The town of St James came into being as a result of selectors taking up land in the district. The name "St James" is believed to have originated from the date of arrival of Mr. C Rutherford at the site of the "run" homestead - St James Day (May 1) 1860. The area was originally known as the St James run.

It is said in St James 1871 - 1977 that around St James the aboriginal people were the Kwat Kwat Tribe with the nearby Pangerang to the south (also known as Bangerang about whom there is the view they were a distinct language group with the Kwat Kwat being one of ten clans making up the tribe).

After the early selections, an increasing number came to the district and took up selections. As the numbers grew a campaign soon got underway for a spur line to be built north from the main railway at Benalla to service the region which had primitive transport options. It had been established the district could produce good harvests and plantings of wheat, barley and oats were increasing. Getting them to market was a problem. In the last days of 1880, the Railway Construction Bill was passed by the Victorian Parliament approving construction of a number of railway lines including one from Benalla terminating in the Parish of St James. There were to be three main stations on the line, Goorambat, Devenish and St James, but the termination point was not at an existing town. The future town of St James was to be built around the railway station. The line took one year to build and the first train pulled into St James on September 3, 1883. It was the intention of the Government that the line would be extended to Yarrawonga and this commenced in mid-1885 and the line opened for traffic on May 6, 1886 with a station at the existing town of Tungamah.

OUR HISTORY

Construction of the railway, which would terminate at a station in a selector's paddock, prompted building of a township before a train had come down the line. Benalla blacksmith Michael Dowling set up business in the new town. Lake Rowan carpenter Joseph Caruthers built houses in St James and he and Michael moved there in 1882.

Mr Carter opened the first store in 1882. Patrick Mullins built the North Eastern Hotel, the first of five hotels in St James. On the other side of the railway W McCague opened a butchery and a bakery and across the road an opposition butcher opened. In late 1882 West and Waters opened a general store.

A post office was opened in St James at the end of 1882. On the completion of the railway, the post office was relocated to the railway station, with post, telegraph and money order facilities. In April 1883 a real estate company announced the establishment of their business. At the same time a forwarding agent advertised their presence. The National Bank opened a branch followed by the Bank of Australasia. Even a football team, the St James Football Club, was formed in May 1883

Various protestant churches were built, but it was a case of musical chairs with churches being built and then relocated elsewhere. The Presbyterians built a church that functioned until the 1970s. From an early stage Catholics went to Devenish where their first church was built in 1876.

G. J. Coles, the founder of the Coles chain of stores, got his start in St James before moving to Melbourne and opening the Coles Variety Store in Smith Street, Collingwood in 1914. Coles as we know it to-day is one of Australia's biggest employers, with stores all over the country. During the Depression GJ employed many of the young friends he had made in St James knowing they were hard workers. It helped many families doing it hard by sending money home.

The history of the Coles Family in St James has continued over the years. GJ never forgot where he had come from, and visited old friends regularly. His generosity and that of the Company, to our town is legendary, with donations to the Recreation Reserve, the Bowling Club, the Golf Club, the St James Hall restoration and a donation to the St James Silo Art.

GJ's last visit to St James was in 1977 for the St James Back-To. He died later on that year.

OUR HISTORY

St James Football Club had many successes and among those footballers were two St James boys who both helped coach St James and became Carlton Captains....Jim Flynn – Played first with Geelong 1897 to 1902 then with Carlton 1903 to 1908 & 1910.... Captain of Carlton 1905 – 1907 & 1910 taking them to Premiership 1906 to 1908.... Gordon Green – played with Carlton 1911 to 1921, Captain 1921.


Wheat was the main crop, with oats to feed the horses. The ground was worked by horse driven plough, followed by harrows. The seed was then cast by hand. On maturity the crop was cut, and stooked to ripen. A steam driven winnower machine travelled from farm to farm to thresh the wheat, which was then bagged and carted to the railway siding in St James. The wheat bags were then stacked, awaiting the train to come and cart it to the Port. The sophistication of modern machinery may have been lacking but evidence of earlier achievements are recorded in the deliveries to St James. In 1915-16 there was a record stack of wheat. 135,000 bags or 405,000 bushels, exceeded only once in 1962-63 421,439 bushels.

Money was raised locally to build a Community Hall under the watchful eye of George Coles Senior. It was officially opened in 1910 coinciding with the purchase of the North-Eastern Stores by GJ Coles, George's son. 100 years on, the Coles Company celebrated both Centenaries with the St James locals, by donating \$110,000 toward the renovation. The Hall was renovated in 2014.

The historic portable police lockup was relocated to the St James Recreation Reserve in 2012 from rear of property on Lake Rowan Road which had been a police station. The lockup was originally at Lake Rowan, but had been moved to St James by October 1884. This was due to the railwayline going through St James and not Lake Rowan. The population of St James flourished, whereas Lake Rowan declined.



1 YEAR:

1 YEAR:

2 YEARS:

Population growth / housing developments -Encourage more houses to be built within town to grow or sustain the population.

PROTECTING OUR ENVIRONMENT AND HERITAGE

6 MONTHS:

Trim peppercorn trees - Prune peppercorn trees located near silos.

History museum - Develop a section of the hall as a historical museum.
